HOW ILLINOIS ADDRESSED A HEALTH CRISIS THROUGH PARTNERSHIP KEEPING K-12 SCHOOLS OPEN DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

OVERVIEW

The Illinois Department of Public Health, the Chicago Department of Public Health, SHIELD Illinois (a University of Illinois System unit), and the Midwest Coordination Center (backed by Battelle) partnered to rapidly coordinate a COVID-19 PCR testing program for K-12 schools in the state of Illinois - keeping kids at school, parents at work, and the economy working.

PARTNERS

Illinois Department of Public Health

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) advocates for and partners with the people of Illinois to re-envision health policy and promote health equity, prevent and protect against disease and injury, and prepare for health emergencies. IDPH received federal funding from the Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act and the American Rescue Plan to address the COVID-19 pandemic, establishing and enforcing health policies for Illinois.

SHIELD Illinois

SHIELD Illinois is a screening and diagnostic testing program that deploys covidSHIELD, the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign's (UIUC) innovative PCR saliva-based test across the state. SHIELD Illinois, a nonprofit unit of the U of I System and example of the university's land-grant mission, works to control the spread of COVID-19 across the state of Illinois, keep schools open, protect workplaces and save lives.

Chicago Department of Public Health

The Chicago Department of Public Health (CDPH) works with communities and partners to create an equitable, safe, resilient, and healthy Chicago. This includes promoting values of diversity, excellence, informed decision making, and teamwork within all residents and smaller communities within the city. CDPH received federal funding from the CARES Act and the American Rescue Plan.

Midwest Coordination Center

The Midwest Coordination Center (MCC), operated by Battelle and federally funded under the Health and Human Services (HHS) Operation Expanded testing (OpET) program, provides free COVID-19 testing to public and private K-12 schools, non-healthcare congregate settings, and underserved communities. MCC provides self-collection testing access, site training and support, and free shipping of test samples to labs within the MCC network, including SHIELD Illinois.



HOW WE SOLVED THEM





Many states discontinued K-12 testing for the 2022-23 school year due to lack of funding or interest in testing.

The desire of IDPH and CDPH to protect public health and the low cost of SHIELD Illinois' and MCC's programs enabled free K-12 testing through the entire 2022-23 school year.

CONCLUSIONS

Screening in K-12 schools helps reduce the spread of COVID-19 in their respective communities. As risk levels get harder to assess, K-12 schools remain a key population to test in order to gain insight into the extent of the spread.

IDPH, CDPH, SHIELD Illinois and MCC developed an effective testing model that continues to be functional and scalable as of October 2022.

The ease and affordability of the program allowed Illinois to provide testing for the 2022-23 school year, when many other states ceased operations.

Illinois' program stands ready to meet the state's needs, should demand for testing increase.

May 2020

University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign develops covidSHIELD

July 2020

SHIELD Illinois was established by the University of Illinois System

February 2021

covidSHIELD received FDA Emergency Use Authorization

March 2021

IDPH announced free testing for EBF Tier 3 and 4 public K-12 schools

June 2021

CDPH announced free testing for K-12 schools in vulnerable communities in Chicago

Partnership formed between SHIELD Illinois and MCC to provide testing to all private schools in Illinois

Partnership between IDPH and MCC is formed to increase capacity

August 2021

IDPH extended free SHIELD testing to every public K-12 school in the state (outside of Chicago)

CDPH announced free testing to all K-12 school in Chicago (outside of CPS)

Test-to-Stay was implemented

Governor's Executive Order required unvaccinated K-12 staff and faculty to test weekly

2022-23 School Year

Testing continues through the school year
